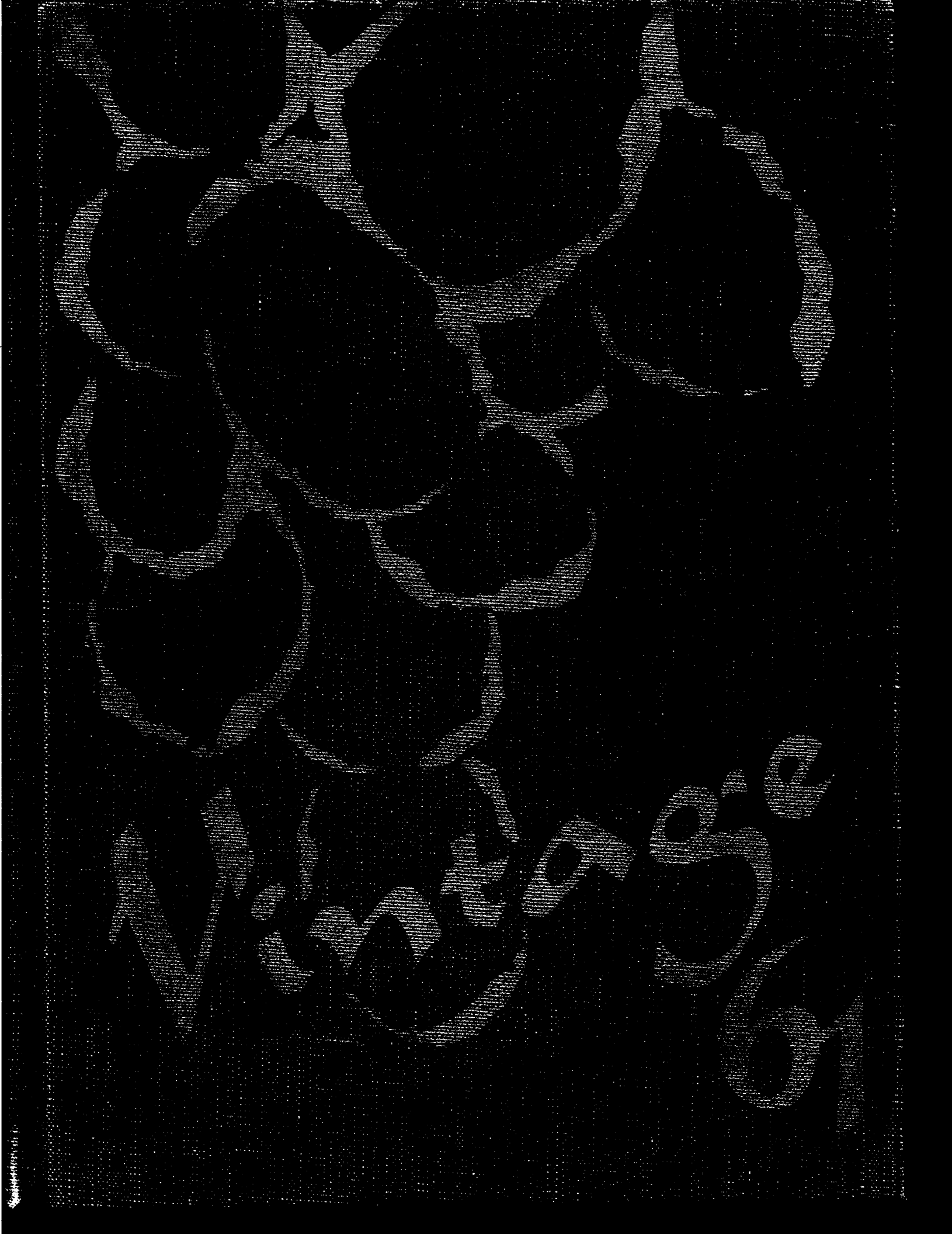

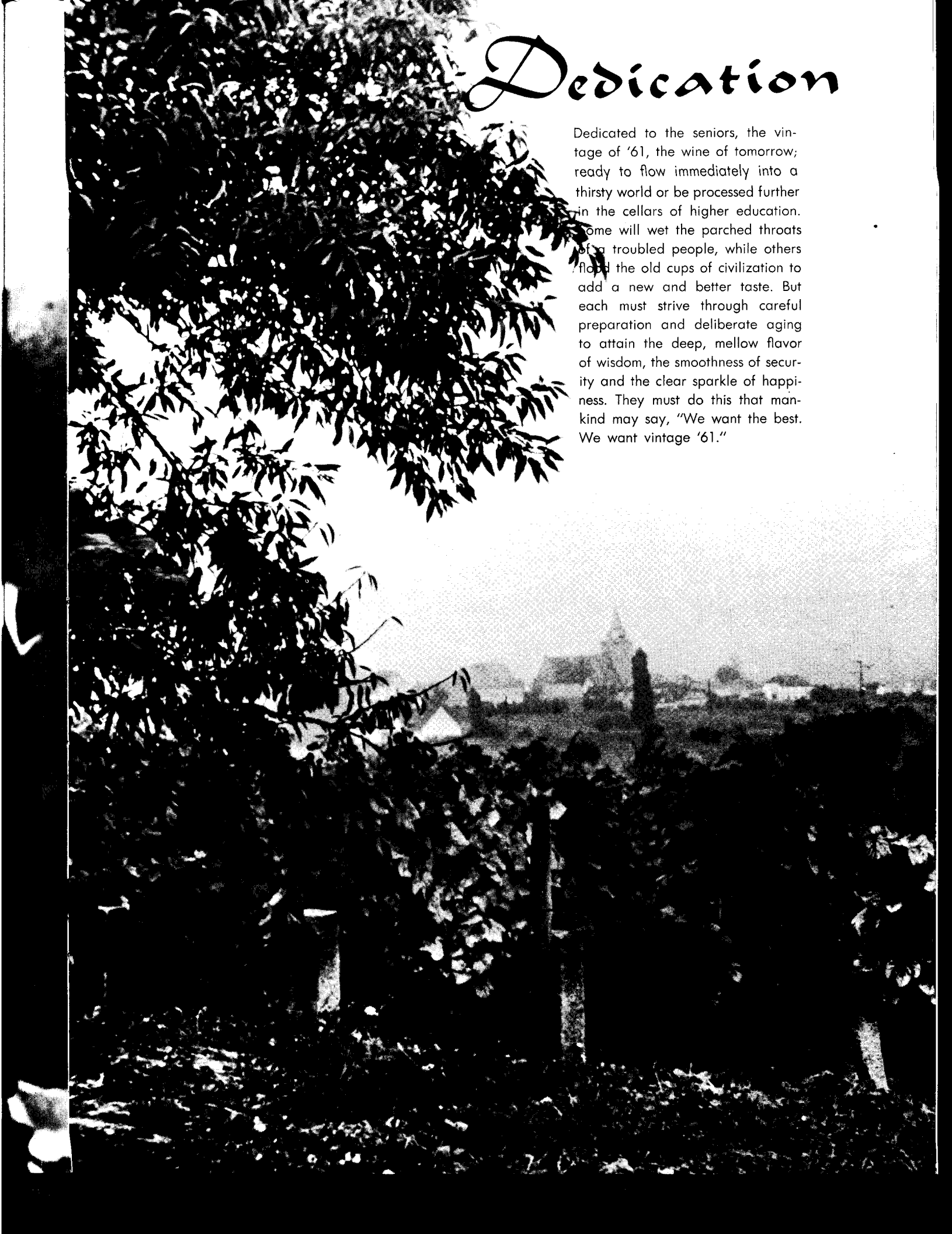
Forward

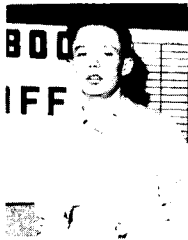
Yuletide harmony from Mr. Carter's music room echoed through the halls of K.H.S. The Christmas program was a huge success, and the auditorium was filled with villagers.

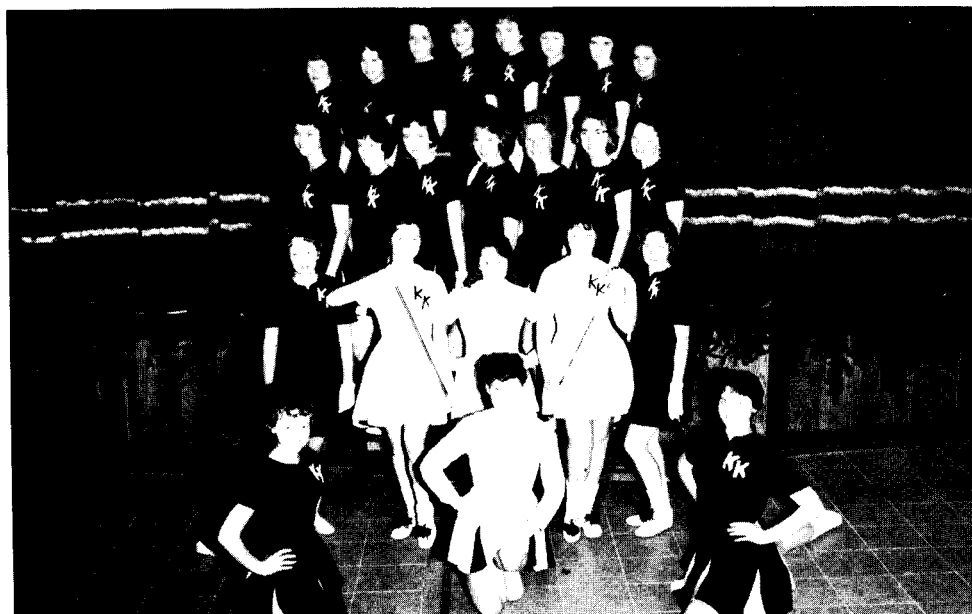

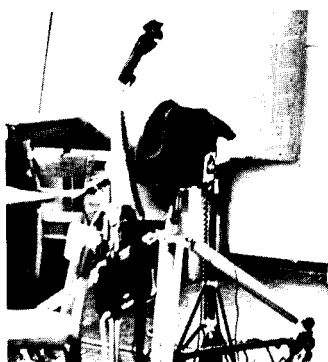

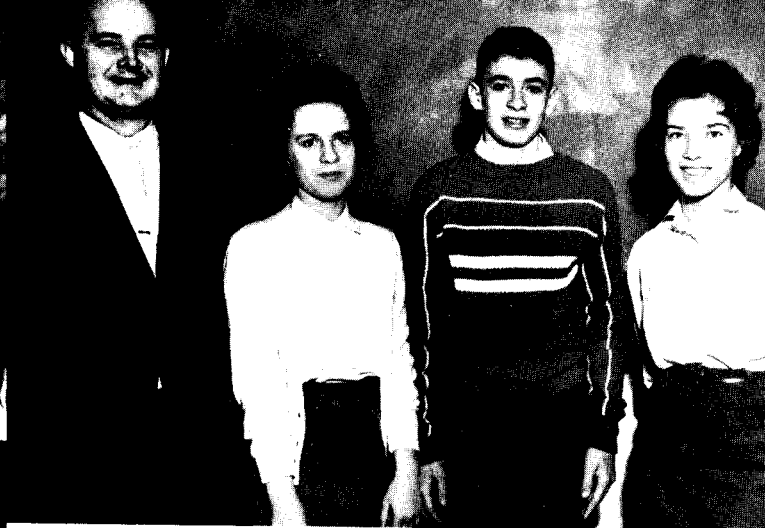

A gathering of green recruits reported to the practice field at the beginning of the year. Within a month an organized coordinated team that functioned like a well-oiled machine was ready to do battle with Bremerhaven, it's first opponent. This was a hard fought, see-saw battle, with the Knights emerging victorious 19-13. 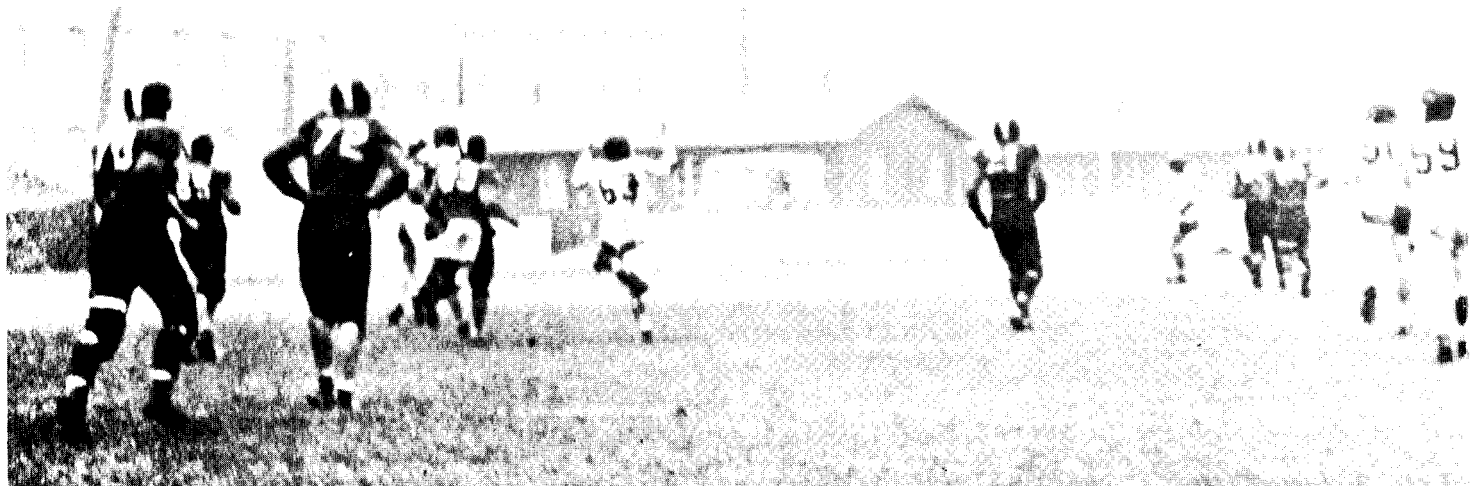

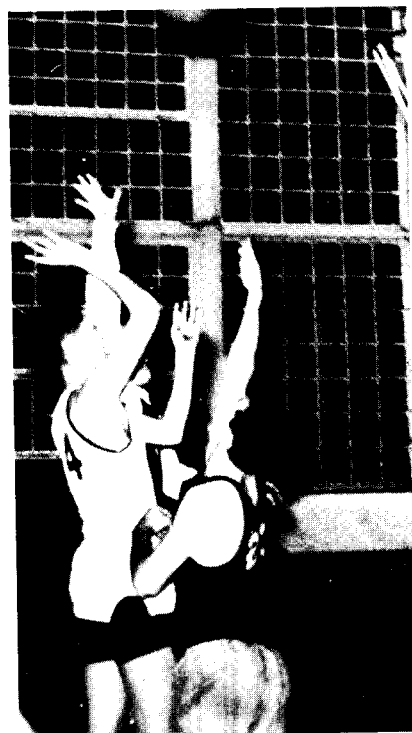

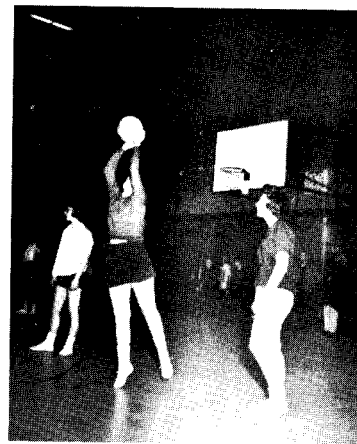
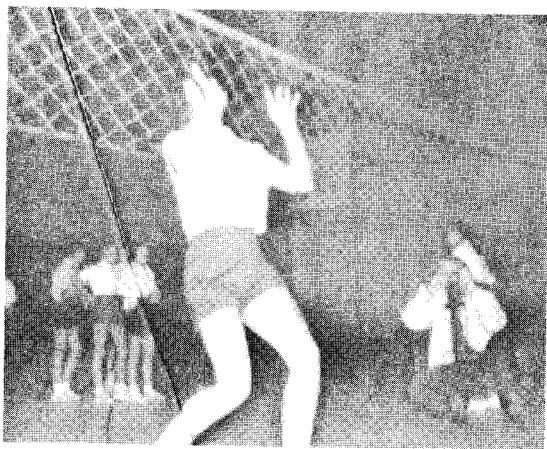
G.A.A.

The diversified sports program included volleyball, basketball, tennis, badminton, bowling and softball. Good attendance was characteristic of all the games.

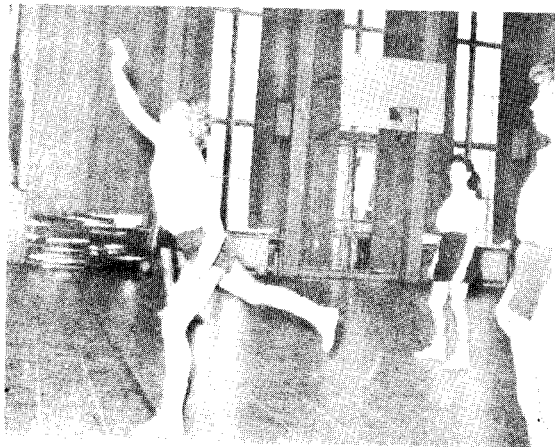

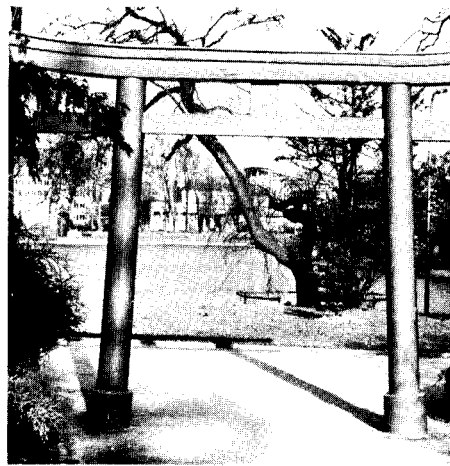

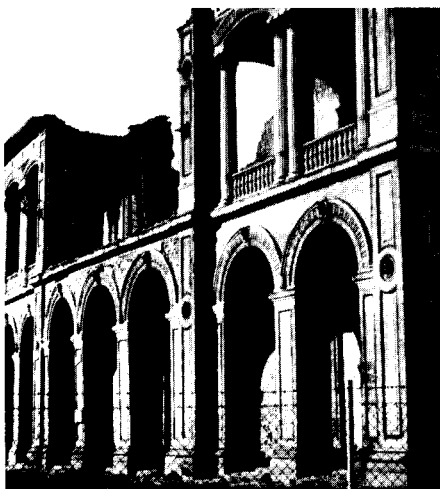

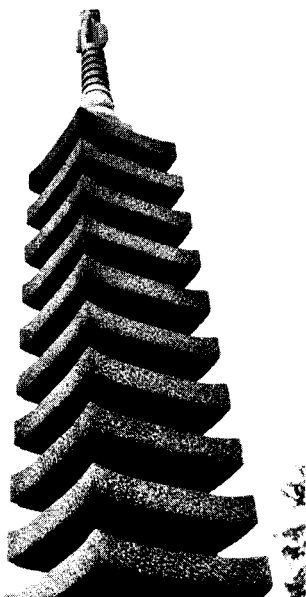
